SPOTLIGHT ON CITY STAFF

Welcome back to Spotlight on City Staff! In this edition we want to not only put the spotlight on a member of Sherwood's hardworking City Staff, but also to highlight a program that we are proud of. In this edition we want to introduce you to our Senior Network Engineer, Duncan Scott and Public Works Operations Supervisor, Konrad Dimmitt. Duncan -

Q: How long have you been working as a Senior Network Engineer?

- A: I've worked for Internet Service providers since 2006. Q: How long have you been with the City of Sherwood?
- A: I've been with the city since August 2023
- Q: What does an average day look like for you?
- A: I spend most of my day at my desk interacting with various remote systems. Occasionally I get to go install or troubleshoot hardware in the field. Throughout the day I assist with fiber installation and troubleshooting as necessary. Most of these systems and processes are pretty stable but occasionally an interesting problem or event occurs. This can involve troubleshooting on our network or assigning customer with troubleshooting their networks.
- Q: What are some of your favorite things about working for the city?
- A: I like the people I work with. I like building something that is of long-term value and useful to the community.
- Q: What are some typical challenges of this position?
- A: Continuity of service is a big challenge. We must work on and maintain a lot of systems while never disrupting service. This requires redundant systems, good planning, and thorough understanding of operational system to ensure that no activity causes unexpected downtime.
- Q: What advice would you give someone who is just beginning in this career? A: Document everything, and then document some more. Personability and communication skills super valuable. As things get more techni-

And last but certainly not least, familiarize yourself and household members with your shut-off valve! Everyone in the house should know where it is and how to use it in an

emergency. They are typically in the garage, outside the home, or in the crawl space. As always, if you have an after-hours water or sewer related emergency you may call the

• If your outdoor faucet has a shut-valve, turn it to the right to shut it off. Then turn on each outdoor spigot to drain the water from the

• Turn on the faucet farthest from your water meter so it has a slow and steady drip. Unsure of where your water meter is? Turn on a

faucet farthest from the street, like in the back of your home or upstairs. This will keep water flowing in your home and make it less

Turn off and drain automatic sprinkler systems and backflow devices. Wrap backflow devices with insulating material.

Insulate hot and cold pipes that are in unheated areas in your home (such as garage, crawl space, or attic).

If you find yourself in freezing temperatures, there are additional steps you can take to avoid a water emergency.

MAYOR UPDATE Metro Approves Sherwood's Urban Growth Boundry

On December 5, the Metro Council voted 6-1 to approve the City of Sherwood's request to expand the urban growth boundary (UGB). This decision marks a major milestone in our city's journey toward a brighter and more prosperous future. The expansion will encompass approximately 1,200 acres to the west and south, surrounding Sherwood High School.

Throughout the planning process, the city actively engaged with residents, business owners, and community stakeholders, ensuring that their voices were heard and their aspirations for Sherwood West were reflected in the final proposal. The city utilized a diverse range of outreach methods, including:

- Community Advisory Committee meetings
- Technical Advisory Committee meetings
- Open Houses
- Online surveys and feedback forms
- Engagement with Sherwood High School students and families

A Vision for a Balanced and Vibrant Future: The Sherwood West Concept Plan outlines a balanced approach to growth, incorporating a mix of land uses that cater to the diverse needs of our community, including:

- 500 Acres of Natural Spaces and Trails: The plan prioritizes the preservation of our natural heritage, setting aside a generous 500 acres for parks, natural areas, and an interconnected network of trails. These trails will enhance the quality of life for Sherwood residents and connect seamlessly with the rest of our community, including our new pedestrian bridge.
- 340 Acres for Housing: The expansion will accommodate much-needed housing consistent with the current character & makeup of Sherwood's neighborhoods. The plan includes innovative zoning approaches such as "cottage clusters," designed to provide single-level, small-footprint starter homes for young families and comfortable living options for seniors wishing to age in place. These clusters will foster a sense of community while contributing to the city's overall housing affordability goals.
- 200 Acres for Family-Wage Jobs: The plan recognizes the importance of economic vitality and designates 200 acres for job creation, focusing on high-tech industries that offer family-wage jobs. This will bolster Sherwood's economic base and provide

residents with more opportunities to live and work within their community.

- . To ensure a well-rounded and thriving community, the plan allocates 30 acres for future school expansion as well as 30 acres for a signature park similar in scale and scope to Snyder Park.
- 60 Acres for Hospitality and Tourism: The plan capitalizes on Sherwood's prime location as the "Gateway to Wine Country," reserving 60 acres for a hospitality district. This district will feature hotels, restaurants, and event spaces that celebrate our region's renowned wine industry and provide a vibrant hub for tourism, sports, and recreation.

With Metro's approval secured, the City will shift its focus to the next critical phase: comprehensive and master planning for Sherwood West. This meticulous process, expected to span 2 to 3 years, will involve translating the high-level vision of the Concept Plan into detailed blueprints for each district, ensuring that the community's desired outcomes are realized. As Salem continues to exert influence on local land use decisions, completing a robust master plan becomes even more crucial. By proactively establishing clear guidelines and regulations for Sherwood West, the City can mitigate the risk of pre-emption from state mandates and retain greater control over its future development. This undertaking will be conducted with the same level of community engagement that characterized the Concept Plan process. The City is committed to working closely with residents, businesses, and stakeholders to fine-tune the master plan and ensure that it aligns with Sherwood's evolving needs and priorities.

We all enjoy an amazing community, which resulted from the planning that leaders and city staff did 30 years ago to chart their future and what is now our present. I am hopeful that the planning process we are starting today will chart a similar path and create an amazing community for future generations of Sherwoodians!

The City of Sherwood extends its heartfelt gratitude to the city staff and the numerous supporters throughout the region who championed our efforts, including our esteemed school district. This collective achievement demonstrates the power of community engagement and collaboration in shaping a brighter future for Sher-

Oregon E-Bike Regulations

Many community members have reached out to us about E-bike regulations. E-bike regulations in Oregon are a bit of a moving target right now. There are federal E-bike laws, State of Oregon E-bike laws, and different cities have a variety of their own city ordinances regarding E-bikes. Sherwood currently does not have an ordinance specifically regarding E-bikes.

Cover foundation vents with foam blocks, thickly folded newspaper, or cardboard.

Open bathroom and kitchen cabinet doors to allow warmer air to flow to pipes.

The state of Oregon defines E-bikes as a bicycle that has two or three fully functional pedals equipped with a motor that does not exceed 1000 watts and is designed with a maximum speed of 20mph. E-bikes in Oregon are not considered motor vehicles but are actually considered a bicycle by the Oregon Vehicle Code and can ride on any roadway, lane, or path that is approved for bicycles (except Class 3). However, Oregon State Parks considers E-bikes as motor vehicles; Oregon Park trails are governed by Oregon Administrative Rules which define "motorized vehicles" as "any vehicle being powered by an engine or motor which is capable of transporting a person". Therefore, there is a blanket prohibition of E-bikes in Oregon state parks.

Under Oregon law, E-bikes cannot be ridden on sidewalks, riders have to be 16 years old or older, and E-bikes do not have a helmet requirement by law (including teenage riders). Last year, a 15-year-old was killed in Bend while riding an E-bike without a helmet. The City of Bend is looking at changing local ordinances regarding E-bikes after

There are three classes of E-bikes and simply put, they differentiate between the top speeds an E-bike can go, and the components involved.

Class 1 E-bikes has a maximum speed of 20mph and is equipped with an electric motor without throttle that works when the rider is pedaling, also known as pedal assist.

This means the E-bike's drive system is only activated once you start pedaling. Class 2 E-bikes provide assistance when pedaling and has a maximum speed of 20mph with a throttle. A throttle is a feature that comes in a grip-twist or button the rider holds down to make the bike ride without medaling.

Class 3 E-bikes feature pedal assist only and has a maximum speed of 28mph. They can go faster than 28mph if the bikes are modified. Due to the higher power of these bikes, they are considered motor vehicles and not bicycles.

Traffic Officer C. Pierce called a local bike shop and asked if there is a way that law enforcement could tell if an E-bike was Class 1, 2, or 3 as it's riding past us. They said

no, and that the only way to figure out the class is to physically inspect the e-bike to see what voltage the electric assist motor is. This particular shop has a Class 3 bike that has been heavily modified with 12,000 watts and has been clocked at 80 mph on radar.



FEATURED PARTNER: TUALATIN RIVER NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE Why do we go to the Refuge?

In its thirty plus year lifetime, the Tualatin River National Wildlife Refuge has seen a lot – picturesque landscapes, dynamic wildlife, and excited visitors. The memories made here are a jumbled pot of some of our best days, and worst days-turned better days. I asked the staff to tell me about some of their favorite memories, and to answer the question, why do we go to the refuge? They span the age of this place and are a lovely mix of exciting encounters with wildlife, and moments of inspiration from the next generation of conservationists. Here is what they came up with -

"Students from the Beaverton High School Eco Club participated in one of our amphibian egg mass surveys. At the end of the day, I posed a question to the students, "What was your favorite part of today?". One student that had started the day nervously shuffling her feet through the creek and hanging onto her friends and walking stick told me that her very favorite part of the day was wearing chest waders for the first time. She described the feeling of floating through the water with a huge smile lighting up her face. By the end of our survey she was confidently moving through the water, helping her classmates find their footing, and grinning from ear to ear."

"I was walking through the unit via the access roads when I flushed a mallard out of some nearby brush. That was when a large dark colored body swooped through my vision and struck the duck midflight – it was the owl! The post-strike image of the duck was like something out of Looney Tunes. The owl had struck hard and taken the duck out of flight, the duck proceeded to crash to the ground and roll a few times before it popped back up and continued flight. Like nothing happened, the mallard was gone in just a few seconds."

"I watched a great blue heron catch and eat a garter snake in the oak savannah. The snake fought a good fight - it tried to wrap itself around the heron's beak and the heron kept trying to move the snake so it could eat the snake head first. It took a long time...but the heron got the snake in the right orientation and ate it."

One staff person talked to me about the Chicken Creek restoration project, and how... so many partners came together to achieve something we couldn't do by ourselves. "Watching folks, especially little humans, get excited at Creatures of the Night. Their faces spoke volumes."

Our longest running staff person recounted to me an amusing visual at a planting event before the refuge was even open - we dug large holes in the ground for trees to be planted, using an excavator. On the planting day, it was so rainy and wet, and at the end of the day, the crew leads from Friends of Trees just sat in the rain-filled excavated holes in their raingear - they were already so wet, it didn't even make a difference sitting in the small pits of water. "One sunny winter day...driving along the dike road between two flooded wetlands, we flushed a short-eared owl from the berm. Everyone piled out in awe as the owl

took flight and circled above us. That in itself would be a great story to share, but within moments, two peregrine falcons joined the circling and began to dive bomb the owl from above. As if that wasn't enough, only a few minutes later, two mature bald eagles came in and circled above the peregrines. Imagining that the owl knew it was in big trouble, it dropped out of the sky and landed in the wetland. To our surprise, that owl started to swim like a duck to the waters edge. Once on land, it quickly and soggily stomped over into a big shrub and hid for its life. We never did see the owl leave its hiding place...it was a wildlife spectacle of a lifetime."
