PLANNING NEWS & CODE COMPLIANCE

Business Licenses & Home Occupation Permits

Did you know that any business or individual located in or conducting business activities within the Sherwood city limits is required to maintain a City of Sherwood business license? This includes brick-and-mortar businesses and home-based businesses ocated in Sherwood. Businesses based outside of Sherwood that are conducting business activities (defined as any activity carried out by a person predominately for economic profit or livelihood) or providing service in the city are also required to have a City of Sherwood business license.

Business licenses must be renewed annually and expire on December 31 of the year n which they were purchased. The city offers an online application for new or renewal ousiness license applications, with a typical turnaround time of 1-2 business days.

Home-based businesses are additionally required to obtain a Home Occupation Permit from the city. Individuals are allowed to operate certain types of businesses from their residence. Home occupation businesses (home-based businesses) are regulated to ensure that they do not alter the residential character of the neighborhood, nor nfringe upon the rights of nearby residents to the peaceful enjoyment of their neighporhood and homes. Home Occupation Permits are required to be obtained annually. Guidelines for Posting Signs this Summer and Election Season

This guide provides a limited overview of what the Municipal Code refers to as "portable signs," which are typically attached to a wood stake or wire frame driven into the ground. They must be freestanding and cannot be attached to any structure or vegetation such as utility poles, traffic signs, street signs, trees, or similar items.

Portable Signs - include garage sale, election, business, and real estate signs.

are defined as "small movable signs no greater than twenty-four (24) inches in height and a sign face no larger than eighteen (18) inches by twenty-four (24) inches in size used for a temporary period of time. Portable signs are stand-alone signs, not attached to a building or any other permanent structure."

Election Signs

The city regulates signs based on their physical characteristics, such as size, construction materials, and location, not the message or content of the sign. The rules for "election signs" are the same as the rules for any other sign.

Portable Sign Regulations

- Signs shall not be illuminated and may not include items that involve motion to at-
- Signs shall not obstruct vehicular or pedestrian traffic.
- It is the responsibility of the person posting a portable sign to remove it.
- No portable sign shall be placed in any publicly owned right-of-way except on Friday after 6:00 a.m. through Sunday at 6:00 p.m.
- Signs shall not create a traffic safety or maintenance problem, and the City may remove any signs that are a problem.

Limitations on Numbers of Portable Signs

- No more than four portable signs are allowed on residential lots.
- No more than one portable sign per business is allowed in all other zones, except the Institutional and Public zone.
- Properties zoned Institutional and Public may place one portable sign every fifty feet for the length of the site's frontage along a public street.

Code Compliance will generally conduct a "sign-sweep" at least once a week to remove any portable signs that are in violation of the sign code.

Welcome back to Spotlight on City Staff! Each edition we want to put the spotlight on some of Sherwood's hardworking City Staff and what they do! In this edition we want to introduce you to our Adult Community Center Manager, Mayia Martin Burbank and Emergency Management Coordinator, Travis Lindberg.

Mayia Martin Burbank -

Q: How long have you been working as the Adult Community Center Manager?

A: I've been working at the Marjorie Stewart Senior Community Center for 6 years.

Q: What does an average day look like for you?

A: There isn't really a typical day, which I love. I do spend a bit each day walking around the center to chat/checkin with our program participants but otherwise I might be doing triage for our mental health programing, creating

programs and working with Tammy (Volunteer Coordinator), connecting program participants to resources, mediating family conversations about aging care, writing grants and finding funding for our various types of programing,

and whatever else happens to come up. Q: What are some of your favorite things about working for the city?

A: I love working for a city that shows commitment to the citizens through supportive services, such as the senior center programs. It allows me the ability to create an atmosphere of belonging for everyone at the senior center to enjoy their lives and grow in all domains of wellness.

Q: What are some typical challenges of this position?

A: The frustration I encounter with lack of general support services for those who need it. There is a great need for advocacy for older adults and for social workers to help older adults through the many processes that are required to receive housing and medical care. It's hard to see

people in pain but it is good to know that we do everything we can to lessen that and make every day a good time. Q: What advice would you give someone who is just beginning in an Adult Community Center role?

A: I would recommend listening and watching. Learn what the people you are serving want and need. Find out what brings them joy. I would also recommend connecting with other adult services providers so you can refer when there is something you can't provide.

Q: What experience do you feel helped prepare you for your current role?

A: I've worked with older adults for over twenty years, both professionally and though volunteerism. I spent many years working in independent retirement living in administrative, marketing, and activity planning. I volunteered with Meals on Wheels for many years as well as the King City Lions Club, Oregon Historical Society and the Oregon Zoo. My undergraduate degree is in cultural anthropology which really helps me

to see each participant as an individual with their own experiences, world views, and needs. Also, I had wonderful relationships with my grandparents, and still do with my grandma who turned 102 in April.

Bonus comment: I love my job. I love knowing that I work every day to help people enjoy their life to the fullest. I love meeting people, getting to know them, and listening to their experiences. Every single day I have a great time with great people.

Q: How long have you been working as an Emergency Management Coordinator?

A: I have been in this role since January of this year. Before this I was the Emergency Preparedness Coordinator for Columbia County for nearly a year. We moved from Minnesota to Oregon in February of 2023 for new adventures. I spent 9 years in Minnesota as a Firefighter/Paramedic for a 📂 major metro suburb of Minneapolis.

Q: How long have you been with the City of Sherwood?

A: I started in January of this year!

Q: What does an average day look like for you?

A: This role requires me to wear many different hats. I manage the occupational health & safety for our public works staff, emergency planning

and preparedness initiatives for the city, and run the city safety program. I usually spend time on each one of those three big functions throughout the day. Q: What are some of your favorite things about working for the city?

A: I love the close, small town feel of Sherwood. I moved from a small town in Minnesota and worked for that city for 9 years. I really enjoy close communities that have a mixture of big box stores and small-town businesses and restaurants. Sherwood offers all of that and is still close to the metro area.

Q: What are some typical challenges of this position?

A: Often the biggest challenge is balancing your time, so each responsibility receives the appropriate amount of attention. I attend several meetings in Hillsboro via Washington County. I live in Hillsboro, so it ends up working out but requires me to be out of the office and away from our staff.

Q: What advice would you give someone who is just beginning in an Emergency Management Coordinator career?

A: I would tell anyone starting to learn how to write a strong grant application. Much of our funding comes from federal and state level grant programs. The more grant funds we can find, the more projects we can fund at the City level to complete various emergency preparedness initiatives.

Q: What experience do you feel helped prepare you for your current role?

A: I spent 9 years working as a career Firefighter/Paramedic in a major metro suburb of Minneapolis, Mn. Many of the mandatory trainings and certificates to qualify for any Emergency Management position are offered for Firefighters. Plus, I have an in-depth of industry language and operations within times of emergency. This is critical or grant writing and emergency planning.

MAYOR UPDATE Bringing Resources Back to Sherwood: A Mayor's Perspective on Ongoing and Future Projects

The mayor, city council, and city staff are committed to securing county, state, and federal funding for major projects in Sherwood without imposing additional tax burdens on our community. This commitment reflects our dedication to seeking alternative sources of funding and exploring creative solutions to support our city's growth and development while prioritizing the financial well-being of our residents.

Current and Completed Projects

We have had some success in securing funding for projects in Sherwood. Recent high-

- New Pedestrian Bridge at Sunset & 99W (29,834,772): This project was funded with State lottery money and Tax Increment Financing. To put it simply, this project is being paid for without dipping into city reserves or increasing taxes on our residents.
- Robin Hood Plaza (1,892,492): This project was funded by federal investments in our community through the Sherwood Urban Renewal Agency.
- Broadband Expansion: (1,665,000): This project was funded with state ARPA dollars. This effort connected Sherwood to King City and Wilsonville, providing rural service and enhancing our overall broadband revenue, which will help keep our rates low for our communities
- Edy Road Improvements (14M): Secured a \$14 million commitment from Washington County for comprehensive safety enhancements, turn lanes, new sidewalks, bicycle lanes, sidewalk strips, trees, crossing signals, and improved lighting.
- Federal Broadband Funding: Thanks to Representative Salinas, an additional \$1 million was included in the latest federal budget to boost our broadband infrastructure and connectivity into rural communities around Sherwood. (This is in addition to the fiber to home project that is in progress)
- Tannery Site Cleanup: We secured 5 million from the EPA to remediate the toxic remnants of the old tannery site on Oregon Street, paving the way for a new public works facility. This cleanup effort will allow for the redevelopment of approximately 4 acres in our downtown core, where the current public works building is located.

Ongoing Efforts and Future Projects

We are not stopping there; several efforts are underway to secure additional funding for critical future projects in Sherwood, including:

Sewer System Upgrades: We are pursuing \$2 million in federal funding to replace outdated 70-year-old clay pipes in our downtown area. This upgrade is vital for effective wastewater management and preventing potential environmental impacts to Cedar Creek and the wildlife refuge.

We talk a lot about the great projects and services our city provides to our community, but we don't often talk about how we pay for many of those efforts. I thought it was important to give you a glimpse of the hard work our city staff and your elected leaders put into funding these amenities that we enjoy today.

This is part of a broader vision to ensure that Sherwood remains a desirable place to live and thrives as a forward-thinking, sustainable community. Our focus on reclaiming and effectively utilizing our tax dollars for the community's benefit is a testament to our commitment to enhancing Sherwood's livability for today and future generations.

POLICE DEPARTMENT NEWS

The Sherwood Police Department, and many other police agencies in the Portland Metro Area have been receiving a significant amount of calls for service pertaining to various types of scams. There are many variations of scams being used but they all have one thing in common; the people behind the scams are wanting to steal your money. A few examples of the scams we have received reports on lately are:

- Jury Duty Scam: Someone receives a phone call from a person pretending to work as a police officer, deputy sheriff, or some kind of federal law enforcement officer. The scammer claims that the person they are speaking with did not show up for jury duty and there is now a warrant issued for their arrest. The scammer will have personal information including phone numbers, addresses, and provide fake case numbers and warrant numbers. The scammers will request for money to be transferred to them by asking the person to purchase Visa gift cards, transferring money through CashApp, a cashier's check, or using a Coin Star machine.
- **Kidnapping Scam:** Someone receives a phone call from a person pretending to have kidnapped a loved one and they are requesting ransom money in return. They will have personal information including phone numbers, addresses, etc. The scammers will request for money to be transferred to them by asking the person to purchase Visa gift cards, transferring money through CashApp, a cashier's check, or using a Coin Star machine.
- Romance Scam: Two people will match on a dating site and eventually enter into a long-distance relationship. The victim not realizing that the person they are in a relationship with, had created a fake profile and is scamming them the entire time, which is called a "Romance Scam". At some point in the relationship, the scammer will begin to ask for money for a variety of reasons, including to be able to fly out to see the victim. Recently we have received reports of victims who have lost between

\$40,000 to \$150,000 to this specific type of scam.

Sextortion Scam: A male matches with a female on a dating app and eventually exchange social media profiles. They begin messaging through one of their social media apps and eventually the conversation turns sexual in nature. The female profile (which is a fake account) will request nude photos from the male and promise to return the favor. After the male sends the photographs, the female account will then extort the male, known as Sextortion. The female profile will request money and threaten that if money is not given, they will send the nude photographs of the male to their friends and family, which they found through the male's friend's list.


