## PLANNING NEWS

### Street Trees Q & A

The City of Sherwood is committed to preserving, enhancing and maintaining its urban forest. The city's trees provide an important backdrop for life in Sherwood. Street trees are those located in the planter strip between the curb and the sidewalk. For neighborhoods without a sidewalk planter strip, street trees are sometimes located in the front yard of each property.

Though the city does not encourage removal of street trees, sometimes it is necessary. This is especially true when trees are considered hazardous or in poor condition. If you are unsure of the condition of your tree, we recommend that you have a certified arborist take a look at it. If it is determined that a tree must be replaced follow frequently asked questions below.

**Q: Do I need a permit to remove a street tree?**

A: Yes. Street trees can be removed through a tree removal permit. In most cases, a replacement tree is required.

**Q: How do I get a permit and how long does it take?**

A: The application can be found online or at City Hall. Submit the completed application, supporting documentation and any applicable fees to the city for review and approval. Most Street Tree Removal Permits can be processed within 10-14 days.

**Q: What should I do when a tree is lifting up the sidewalk in front of my house?**

A: Consult with an ISA certified arborist about preserving the tree. If this is not possible, find out whether a tree removal permit is required and obtain one, if necessary. A Right-of-Way (ROW) permit may be required for the repair of the sidewalk. ROW permits for sidewalk repair are exempt from fees. Contact Engineering Department staff for more information at 503.925.2305.

**Q: Do I need a permit to plant a tree in the planter strip or public right-of-way fronting my property?**

A: Yes the city must approve the species and planting location for street trees per the in the Sherwood Municipal Code Section 16.142. Check with the city regarding specific permit requirements.

**Q: I'm worried about my street tree. Can the city come out and inspect it?**

A: Street trees, although they may be in the public right of way, are the adjacent property owner's responsibility. We recommend hiring ISA certified arborists for tree inspections.

**Q: How do I determine who owns a tree or is responsible for its maintenance?**

A: The only way to definitively determine the ownership of a tree is by hiring a Professional Land Surveyor (PLS) to survey the tree in relation to property lines. A local PLS can be found at [www.plso.org](http://www.plso.org).

**Q: Will the city maintain or remove the street tree in front of my house?**

A: No, street tree maintenance is the responsibility of the fronting property owner. Street trees should be maintained per tree care industry standards. In addition, tree branches need to be maintained 7 feet above sidewalks and streets (see Clear Vision Areas brochure for details). The city recommends working with an ISA certified arborist to maintain street trees.

**Q: I'm worried about the condition of a tree on my property. Can the city come out and inspect it?**

A: No, trees on private property are the owner's responsibility. We recommend hiring an ISA certified arborist for tree inspections.

**Q: I'm worried about a tree on my neighbor's property. What can the city do?**

A: We recommend first contacting your neighbor to try and work out a solution.

**Q: I'm worried about the condition of a tree on city property, such as a park or greenway. Who should I contact?**

## SPOTLIGHT ON CITY STAFF

Welcome back to Spotlight on City Staff! Each edition we want to put the spotlight on some of Sherwood's hardworking City Staff and what they do! In this edition we want to introduce you to our Technical Services Librarian Rachel Seltz and City Volunteer Coordinator Tammy Steffens.

**Rachel -**

**Q: How long have you been working as a Technical Librarian?**

A: I have been working as the Technical Services Librarian for the City of Sherwood for six years.

**Q: How long have you been with the City of Sherwood?**

A: Six years.

**Q: What does an average day look like for you?**

A: My responsibilities include acquisitions, cataloging and collection development. I work with vendors to purchase new library materials and strategize how to add new collections to the library, such as our Library of Things and Board Game items. I am the primary cataloger for the library, as well. I create and maintain accurate records for our books and other items so that you can find what are looking for, whether you are searching the online catalog or our shelves. You might also see me out at the reference desk during after-school hours.

**Q: What are some of your favorite things about working for the city?**

A: I'm proud to be part of a dedicated team of public servants working hard to make Sherwood a wonderful place to live. I love getting to know community members as they visit the library. I'm so excited to see what the future will bring as the city grows.

**Q: What are some typical challenges of this position?**

A: The library adds about 7,000 new items a year! It is my goal to make all of these new items available to patrons as quickly as possible. I am always thinking of creative ways to get the most use of our shelving space so that we can keep growing our collections.

**Q: What advice would you give someone who is just beginning in this role?**

A: For anyone just starting out in libraries, I would say this work is such a rewarding way to serve the community. Seek out experience in different library roles and be flexible and determined. There are so many ways to use your talent to make the library an amazing place.

**Q: What experience do you feel helped prepare you for your current role?**

A: I'm originally from Ann Arbor, Michigan, a beautiful college town. I obtained my master's degree in library science while working at the Ann

Arbor District Library. When I moved to Oregon, I began working as a librarian at the Tigard Public Library before joining the City of Sherwood in my current role. I've worked a wide range of library jobs, previously in public-facing roles with youth and adults, and now more behind-the-scenes as a Technical Services Librarian.

**Tammy**

**Q: How long have you been working as the City Volunteer Coordinator?**

A: I've coordinated volunteers for almost 20 years.

**Q: How long have you been with the City of Sherwood?**

A: This is my tenth year with the city.

**Q: What does an average day look like for you?**

A: I recruit, screen, onboard, and place volunteers in city departments like our senior center, library, arts center, police department, and public works (adopt-a-road). I organize the city's Earth Day Celebration (Trashpalooza), Arbor Day Celebration, tree planting events, volunteer recognition events, and more. I also manage our community garden so I renew and issue new garden plot assignments, and make sure all guidelines and rules are followed throughout the season.

**Q: What are some of your favorite things about working for the city?**

A: The people – staff and volunteers! Both groups of people are incredible. They truly care about making this community the best it can be.

**Q: What are some typical challenges of this position?**

A: My biggest challenge is probably matching a community member's interest, availability, and skills, with what a department's needs are. For example, the senior center is open 9am-4pm, Monday through Friday. I might have someone who would love to volunteer there but their work or school schedule conflicts with that.

**Q: What advice would you give someone who is just beginning in this role?**

A: It would depend on the position.

**Q: What experience do you feel helped prepare you for your current role?**

A: Coordinating volunteers when I served on the SHS Booster Club Board and with the Bowmen Football program helped me develop some skills. I think also being involved with the community before working for the city helped me make some key connections that are beneficial for me today.

We just finished an observance of Child Abuse Prevention Month during the month of April. You may have noticed blue ribbons and pinwheels showing up all over the place. The Blue Ribbon had its early beginnings in 1989 when a Virginia grandmother tied a blue ribbon to the antenna of her car as a tribute to her three-year-old grandson who died as a result of abuse – symbolizing the blue of her grandson's bruises. This was her way to honor him and bring awareness about his tragic story and the overall issue of child abuse. The Blue Ribbon Campaign has since expanded across the country and remains a symbol of child abuse prevention today.

Every day in this country, millions of children face neglect, physical, emotional, or sexual abuse in our country. Abuse and neglect can have a long-lasting impact, but many times, it can appear almost invisible. Every child deserves a safe childhood. Spreading awareness and prevention efforts are vital to enhancing public safety for children and families.

This occurs in every town, city and community, and ours is no exception. Our detectives, SROs, and patrol officers are investigating potential child abuse daily.

Spotting signs of child abuse can save lives. If you have kids in your life, whether they're family, neighbors, or friends, you can help by keeping an eye out for unexplained injuries, changes in behavior, and listening when they voice concerns. When you speak up for a child, you help create a safer community for our kids.

Here's how you can help: keep a look out for the following signs in your children's friends, and teach your children to look out for these signs and symptoms in their friends...and if you see something, say something!

- Withdrawal from friends or usual activities
- Sudden changes in behavior, such as aggression, anger, and hostility
- Sudden loss of self confidence

- Sleep problems and nightmares
  - An apparent lack of supervision
  - Self-harm or suicide attempts
  - Unexplained injuries, such as bruises, burns, or broken bones
  - Injuries that don't match the given explanation, or don't match the child's developmental ability
  - Sexualized behavior or knowledge that is inappropriate for the child's age
  - Statements about being abused
  - Poor growth or personal hygiene
  - Lack of clothing or supplies to meet physical needs
  - Hoarding or stealing food
- Keep in mind that these are just warning signs, and by themselves may not indicate abuse or neglect. Trust your instincts, and if you see something, say something. Law enforcement and DHS can't start investigating or ensure a child's safety until we know something is happening, and that starts with you, the community.
